

DDC VIP Kids Day— A Day in the Life

Instead of attending camp or spending their usual day of summer away from their parent, more than 40 children made the trip to work with mom or dad at the Defense Distribution Center for the annual DDC VIP Kids Day on July 28. The VIP Kids Day is scheduled in honor of the national “Take Your Child to Work Day,” normally held in April.

To kick off the festivities for the day, the children accompanied their parents at 10:15 a.m. to the Commander’s Conference Room for a “pint-sized” version of the command brief, complete with a video highlighting DLA and its mission. Following the brief, the group met at the Eastern Distribution Center for a tour of the warehouse.

At the start of the tour, SFC Willie King, USA, DDSP Transportation Office, led the parents and children to a table where some of the most popular items requested by Soldiers were on display. SFC King held up a Chemical Light, which sparked the interest of many of the children who wanted to take the “glow stick” home as a souvenir.

Following lunch in the In Flight Café, the parents and children met at the DDSP Public Safety facility where one of the main attractions, police cars and fire trucks, were on full display. With lights flashing and the siren sounding, the police car appealed to many kids, as the children took turns piling into the front and back seats.

The next stop was the firehouse. Firefighter EMT Jared Mumma stood ready for a fire equipment drill. The drill is a test given to DDSP firefighters to time how long it takes for them to don their equipment. EMT Mumma’s time was just under one minute and thirty seconds, according to one spectator. Assistant Fire Chief John Breining said, “The equipment a firefighter wears is worth about \$3,000. The air pack is filled with enough oxygen to last about 30 minutes.”

The scheduled events ended at the DDSP Child Care Center where the Kids Day participants got a tour from School Age and Youth Director Amanda Munoz. In addition to planned camps, the School Age Services program has a 12 station computer/homework lab complete with Internet access.

DDC and DDSP participate in the program to allow for a DDC parent to show their child where they work, what they do, and to meet their co-workers.

Paul Holbert, a Contract Specialist at DDC, said his two kids loved going to VIP Kids Day. “They attended last year and they really enjoyed participating in the activities. They liked watching the video in the conference room. Last year, my son really loved the tour. We look forward to VIP Kids Day.”

Overall, more than one hundred children participated in the DDC and DDSP 2005 VIP Kids Day.
